Thank you for your memorandum of October 29, reminding budget makers of the need for funds for materials to be added to the Black Studies Room in the Library.

As perhaps you have heard we are confronted with our greatest financial difficulty since President Atwood arrived in 1963. Every department will of necessity feel the pinch.

You will also recall that the faculty is deeply concerned about funds for the library. Several departments have appealed for special allocations. At recent meeting of the College Faculty a resolution was passed 7 for massive additional funds. There is no doubt of the need. The only question is how.

I am merely reciting our difficulties. All of us recognize the special need pointed out in your memorandum and can only promise to do our best. I am sure too that when a Director of Black Studies arrives he will add his support to your appeal for funds for the Black Room.

Thank you for calling this item to my attention at this time.
